School of International and Public Policy (IPP) was established in 2005 as a “joint venture” between Graduate School of Economics and Graduate School of Law at Hitotsubashi University (est. 1875) to offer innovative, interdisciplinary Master’s programs in law, economics, and international relations. Nearly half of its students are international, which makes IPP a unique intellectual community of rich diversity. Courses are offered in Japanese and English. Its main campus is well known for its beauty and tranquility, located in Kunitachi, a city in western part of Tokyo. IPP also offers some courses in its downtown Chiyoda campus.

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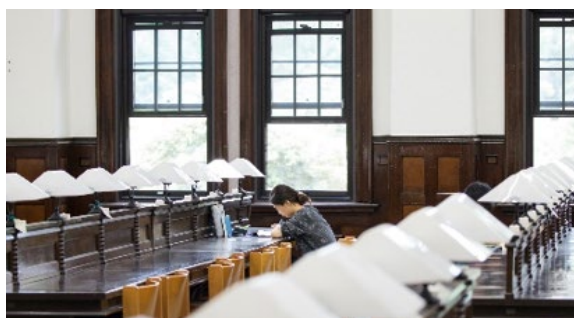
EXCHANGE PROGRAM AT IPP

IPP always welcomes exchange students from its partner universities. Students who have been nominated as exchange students can apply to study at IPP for either Autumn-Winter semester (September to January) or Spring-Summer semester (April to July). Most exchange students to IPP study for one semester, but some stay longer. Ask the person/office at your university for the duration of the exchange program.

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT

Exchange students are expected to have English proficiency of CEFR B2 or above (equivalent to TOEFL iBT 4.0 [80 on the previous scale] or IELTS Academic 6.0). Proof of English proficiency must be submitted at the time of application, either through a standardized test score report or an official certification issued by the home institution.

For enrolling in courses conducted in Japanese, exchange students must possess a minimum language proficiency in Japanese of JLPT Level 2 or N2.



STUDYING AT IPP

(1) Enroll in Specialized Courses/Seminars Conducted in English or Japanese

Exchange students can take any courses of their academic interest, except for some (e.g., thesis workshops for degree-seeking students) at IPP. Ask IPP Office when registering.

IPP Courses: Foreign Service Sub-program within Global Governance Program and Asian Public Policy Program at IPP offer many courses in English, most of which are available to exchange students. The course list will be updated in March with the definitive courses for the Spring/Summer semester and in August with the definitive courses for the Autumn/Winter semester.

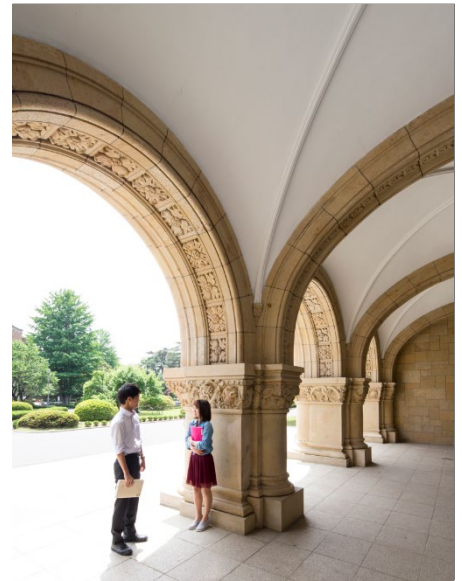

Hitotsubashi University Global Education Program (HGP):

HGP also offers courses conducted in English. Only a limited number of graduate-level courses are available in English under HGP; however, undergraduate courses conducted in English are open to graduate students.

Note: Courses offered under the Master of Business Administration Program (MBA), the School of International Corporate Strategy (ICS), and Business Law are NOT open to exchange students.



(2) Enroll in Japanese Language Courses

Japanese language courses (basic, intermediate, and advanced) are offered by the Hitotsubashi Japanese Language Education Program (not by IPP) and are available for exchange students.

(3) Research Under a Supervisor

Graduate exchange students can do their research under a supervisor who specializes in a field that matches their interests if they are permitted to do so.

REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT

Except for those who have been permitted to research under a supervisor at IPP, exchange students are required to register for 6 slots (1 slot=1h45m) per week throughout the semester to maintain their visa status.

COURSE REGISTRATION

Course registration will be done during the first week of each semester. Details on online registration will be given in an orientation session for exchange students at the beginning of each semester.

GRADE POLICY

In accordance with the Academic Calendar, grades will be announced on Grade release dates. Official transcripts will be issued at the end of August for Spring-Summer Semester and at the end of March for Autumn-Winter Semester. IPP grading scale is: A+ (Outstanding), A (Excellent), B (Good), C (Satisfactory), and F (Fail). A and A+ shall be given to no more than one-third of the students in each course. A+ shall be given to no more than one-third of A students.

CREDITS

In general, one once-a-week course per semester at IPP makes 2 credits. 44 credits are required to earn a MA degree at IPP. Requirements for exchange students (non-degree students) are set by their home universities.

CREDIT TRANSFER

Exchange students must confirm with their home university in advance if the courses they take are recognized for credit transfer. Although all courses at IPP are for graduate students only, some in other graduate programs at Hitotsubashi (e.g., Graduate School of Economics or Law) are open to advanced undergraduate students. Those courses may not be recognized as “graduate” courses at their home institution.

FEES

Tuition fees are exempt for exchange students from partner universities with a tuition waiver agreement.

HOUSING

Hitotsubashi University has two residential halls for exchange students: Residence Hall Kunitachi on our Kunitachi campus and Residence Hall Ikkyo-Ryo on our Kodaira campus. Exchange students at IPP are given priority for a single room in Residence Hall Ikkyo-Ryo, with use of a common area to be shared with residents on the same floor. However, not all exchange students are guaranteed a room due to limited availability.

After being nominated to study as an exchange student at IPP by their home institution, applicants wishing to apply for student exchange should submit the application forms through the relevant office of their home institution. Application forms submitted directly to the IPP Office will not be accepted.
